## Read to Achieve (RtA) Information Session for Parents of Third Graders at ECS

## Background:

- Read to Achieve (RtA) legislation (G.S. §115C-83.1A) was passed by the General Assembly in 2012.
- RtA became effective at the beginning of the 2013-2014 school year.

## **Program Components:**

- Teachers will assess students to make this determination, based on essential aspects of reading: comprehension, fluency, vocabulary, phonics and decoding, oral language, etc.
- Many types of data will be used: observation, class work, homework, assessments, running records, iReady reading assessment, fluency checks, etc.
- Reading growth will be assessed using iReady benchmark levels below to determine whether a student is on track to be reading on the grade level by the end of third grade.

- Many aspects of the ECS reading program already address these specific skills, including: annotating, close reading, and written responses to text.
- If a child does not appear to be on track, remediation strategies will occur in class and parents may be asked to provide additional support at home.
- At the end of third grade, each student will be assessed to see if they have met the RtA requirements

## What should I do now?

- Please, do not talk to your child about testing or any end of year implications!! A fear of reading or of testing will paralyze your child and slow our abilities to help your child grow.
- Make reading a priority for your family.
  - o Ensure that your child reads for a minimum of 20 minutes each night.
  - Sometimes have the child read out loud to you. Sometimes read out loud to your child.
  - Ask your child INFERENCE questions about the reading. (drawing conclusions from information in a text to determine an answer not explicitly stated)
  - Be sure your child always has a book set aside for when the current book is finished. No lag time!
  - Ask your child to read things to you such as a recipe, street sign, weather forecast, etc.
  - Review the items coming home in the Tuesday folder each week. Talk about questions missed and help the child correct mistakes.
- Go home and process what you've heard. Understand that we will update you as we confirm changes.

- Write down specific questions or concerns you have about your child and ask them in a scheduled parent-teacher conference.
- Do not try to have a conference at lunch or on a field trip or any unscheduled time. Allow your teacher the courtesy of preparing a scheduled meeting.
